

CONGRESSIONAL ROOM NUMBERS

Cannon House Office Building (CHOB)

- · Any three-digit room number.
- The first digit indicates the floor.

Longworth House Office Buildings (LHOB)

- Four digit room numbers beginning with "1".
- The second digit indicates the floor.

Rayburn House Office Building (RHOB)

- Four digit room numbers beginning with "2".
- The second digit indicates the floor.

Introduction of Attendees

Introduce ABMA

- Established in 2021
- We represent members in 17 states
- ABMA's Mission is to advance, shape, and influence policy in all branches of government.

Issues

- Introduce issue.
- Give examples of what the legislation seeks to address and how it would impact your business
- The ask (e.g., cosponsorship)

Wrap-up

- Thank the member/staffer for their time
- Give them the priority issues document and ask for their contact information.



MEETING TIPS

- 1. **Get a Photo:** If the legislator is present, they might leave early so try to get a photo at the beginning. If no legislator, try to get a photo of our group in front of the office sign or in the office.
- 2. **Share Your Story**: The best thing you can do is offer information about how a bill will impact your business and your employees or ability to hire more people. It helps to "humanize" an issue and lets legislators understand the real impact it can have on people in their district.
- 3. **Don't Argue:** if the legislator or staffer tries to argue about an issue, don't engage; try to move to the next issue. This doesn't mean you cannot correct incorrect information they might have, but it is best to avoid getting into an argument.
- **4.** If You Don't Know, Say So: If they ask a question you don't know the answer to, it is ok to admit it; take note of it and let them know you will have staff get back to them on that.
- **5. Be Ready for Things to Change:** Sometimes committee or other meetings are called or votes come up and your meeting time can be changed with a legislator. If that happens, Nicolina will text you about any changes.
